# TASSIE SALMON FARMING SUPPORT GROWS - WE'RE ALL HERE FOR TASSIE SALMON

- The importance of the Tasmanian aquaculture industry to Tasmanians has grown
- The salmon industry has maintained strong support from the Tasmanian community
- Tasmanians want more information from the industry
- This is proof that Tasmanians value fact over fiction
- More Tasmanian businesses are supporting the industry

Independent EMRS polling undertaken in November shows the importance of Tasmania's aquaculture industry has grown and salmon farming has maintained strong support across the state.

In the six months since the last independent poll in May/June, 75% of people polled rated the aquaculture industry as important or very important (up by 3%).

Only 8% of people polled indicated the industry was "not important" to Tasmania (down by 1%), ranging in reasons including impact on local environment.

78% respondents did not oppose the salmon industry in Tasmania (% remained the same).

TSGA spokesperson Angela Williamson, said the industry is proud of these results and that the marginal decreases to reasons for opposing the salmon farming industry shows industry efforts in transparency and communication are cutting through:

- negative impacts on the environment dropped from 74% to 66%
- negative impacts on wildlife/wildfish/marine life dropped from 47% to 39%.

"The polling emphasises that the industry has a great story to tell and that we need to keep telling it.

"However, there's still work to do when it comes to communication and providing information. People want to know more about our industry and that's completely understandable, we're big employers and we have significant responsibilities.

"Like us, our detractors need to be held to a level of scrutiny. It's important the conversation is based on facts, not opinion." Ms Williamson said.

**What's ahead** The TSGA and partners are committed to sharing more information, busting myths and ensuring the overwhelming support for the industry across Tasmania isn't diminished by politically motivated scare tactics.

The Tasmanian Salmon Growers Association commissioned an independent poll in November 2021 that confirmed positive community sentiment for the industry.

This followed an identical poll undertaken in May/June 2021.

Again, 1000 Tasmanians from all regions of the state and age categories from 18 – 70+ years were interviewed.
